A Service of Light on the Longest Night



"O Holy Night" Christmas Concert, December 10, 7pm

This year's Christmas Concert will feature two familiar EUMC singers, David Hendrix and Danielle Reutter-Harrah singing favorite songs of the season like O Holy Night, Jesu Bambino, and Messiah excerpts. Members from the EUMC Ensemble will add traditional Christmas Carols through the program. The concert is free, but donations are welcome in support of the EUMC music program.

Danielle Reutter-Harrah performs baroque music from coast to coast. She recently performed the role of Vespetta in Telemann's comic chamber opera Pimpinone with the Boston Early Music Festival, which the Boston Globe called "terrific." Her favorite past performances include Monteverdi's Il ritorno d'Ullise in patria (Melanto) and Orfeo (La Musica/Messagiera), Purcell's Dido and Aeneas (Dido/Belinda), and Handel's Ariodante (Ariodante). She performs frequently with local Seattle ensembles including Pacific MusicWorks, Whidbey Island Music Festival, and the Byrd Ensemble. Upcoming performances include Bach's



Coffee Cantata with Baroque Chamber Orchestra of Colorado (Lieschen), Mozart's C Minor Mass with Sonoma Bach (soprano), and a concert with Seattle Baroque Orchestra entitled "For All Our Sisters." Danielle received her BM from the University of Denver's Lamont School of Music and her Masters of Music from the San Francisco Conservatory of Music and teaches voice and piano privately.

Eric Neuville Hailed for his "seemingly effortless vocal acrobatics" (Capital Times), Seattle-based tenor Eric Neuville is a regular on operatic and concert stages throughout the country. His GRAMMY-award



winning career has included performances of Young Thompson in Cipullo's Glory Denied with Nashville Opera, Laurie in Adamo's Little Women with Madison Opera, Mozart's Requiem with the Seattle Symphony conducted by Itzhak Perlman, Testo in Monteverdi's Il combattimento di Tancredi e Clorinda with Seattle Opera, John Muehleisen's Pietá with the St. Olaf Choir and Magnum Chorum, a remounting of the award-winning recital Modern Dickinson at the Victoria Bach Festival, and the world premiere of John Muehleisen's A Kipling Passion with Choral Arts Northwest. He also has been a regularly featured ensemble member and soloist with Austin based ensemble, Conspirare, as well as locally with Pacific MusicWorks. He

holds degrees from St. Olaf College, The University of Texas at Austin, and the University of Washington. Eric currently resides in Seattle with his wife and two kids and recently made a career change to pursue his dream of becoming a pilot, which he now does for Alaska Airlines full time.

Busy People – Edmonds United Women in Faith

This is our end of the year report. In Edmonds, we are a small but mighty group. We're in a lot of places—managing a thrift shop with only 8 volunteers and making connections with other groups in the surrounding community. Our group meets once a month for lunch, trying different restaurants in the local area. We also host Movies with a Message in the church library on the second Saturday of the month (all are welcome). In August this year we hosted a rummage sale earning \$681.

This year we changed our operating days in the Thrift Shop to Thursdays, Fridays, and Saturdays and this year, we made a real effort to give unsold items to other charities "in kind" allowing them to connect with homeless and low income families directly. Our list includes Washington Kids in Transition, Clothes for Kids, Pathways for Women Dress for Success program, Aurora Commons, EUMC Women's Retreat, and Habitat for Humanity. One week, a few of us helped serve dinner and food staples

at Annie's Kitchen. We plan to return.

Our annual Holiday Bazaar is on December 1 & 2 and includes vendors, bakery tables, Christmas items, and gift items. The Thrift Shop will be open for shopping too! This is a two day event and on Saturday, we are hosting a silent auction with fabulous treasures.

The profits from our thrift shop go to local and international charities in addition to supporting missions in our own church. This year's cash donations will go to the following charities—Feeding America, Feed the Children, Smile Train, Pathways for Women, Washington Kids in Transition, Heifer Project, Scout Troop 312, Women's Retreat, Edmonds Food Bank, Edmonds Toy Shop, UMCOR, and Atlantic Street Center for a total of \$4,280. We also paid an allocation of \$4,000 to United Women in Faith for missions.

Big thanks to Dana Brown, Pastor Donna, to the planning team, the AV guys, the kitchen helpers, the table facilitators and scribes, and to everyone who gave up their Saturday to plan on our church goals and plans for the coming five years.
