

Meet our new pastor, Rev. Jeremy Smith

Close on the heels of Pastor Donna's retirement in June announcement, the Bishop announced this week the appointment of Reverend Jeremy Smith to become our new Pastor on July 1.

Pastor Smith has been the lead pastor at Seattle First UMC for the past five years. Prior to that he was Associate Pastor at Portland UMC working with Pastor Donna.



Pastor Smith met with the EUMC Board under the direction of District Superintendent Mark Galang on Thursday, January 25, so we could all receive confirmation that God was calling him to serve our church as pastor. All around the table was complete agreement that he would be a good match for EUMC and EUMC a good match for Jeremy and his family.

Originally from Oklahoma, Jeremy ("the son of the only two progressives in the state" he says), has been the pastor of churches in

Massachusetts, Oklahoma, Oregon, and now Washington. Jeremy graduated from Oklahoma City University with a BA in Religion, and Boston University School of Theology with a Masters of Divinity.

Along with being a pastor, Jeremy is best known for social media advocacy and his technology and faith blog "Hacking Christianity," which has been featured on United Methodist news sources, National Public Radio, The Progressive Christian magazine, and Sojourners. Jeremy received the Young Alumnus award from BU in 2011 and the Alumnus of the Year award from OCU in 2020 in recognition of his ministry and online engagements.

His wife, Chelsea Paxton, grew up in nearby Bothell and is happy to be back home in Washington state and near her family. They have three daughters Anjali, Caeli, and Nora and a cat.

They are both very excited for the short commute from the parsonage to the church after commuting for five years from their home in Renton to First Church on Queen Anne in Seattle—a 45 to 60 minute drive each way!

Coping With Loneliness

A survey conducted in 2020 by Cigna found that 61% of the 10,000 adults surveyed felt lonely. According to recent articles in many news publications, that statistic hasn't changed much as we begin 2024. Loneliness impacts people in various ways, such as depression, health issues, and physical pain. While there are no easy answers or quick fixes for loneliness, mental health professionals suggest that there are ways to ease loneliness.

Volunteer: Few ways can reduce loneliness and bring happiness as much as volunteering for a cause you believe in. Our faith community at Edmonds United Methodist Church offers many volunteer opportunities. Helping others can be a source of meaning and gratitude, and can act as an antidote to loneliness.

Practice Self Care: Self Care is especially important when coping with feelings of loneliness. The seven anchors of self-care are: (1) Physical—Taking care of your body by getting enough sleep, good nutrition, exercise and regular checkups from your healthcare providers. (2) Mental—Doing things that keep your mind healthy, such as paying attention to your psychological well-being by practicing acceptance and self-compassion; keeping your mind sharp by engaging in activities that stimulate your brain. (3) Spiritual—Nurture your spiritual self through prayer, meditation,

spiritual reading, and engaging in community with others in your faith community.

Strengthen Existing Relationships and Develop New Ones: Reach out to friends and family more often. Find ways to get together. Start slowly if you are struggling with motivation. Develop new friendships. A strong social network is beneficial for your mental health. Join a class or club. Social connections can help to stave off loneliness.



Seek Help: Stephen Ministry, a group of trained volunteers at EUMC, can offer help by providing a caring Christian presence and one-to-one emotional and spiritual support. 



Adult Programs for Winter Quarter

Our Adult Programs Guide for Winter Quarter came out in the E-News last week. These church programs are designed to bring people together in relationship to explore the life and work of this church community. In a time when we need each other after three years of COVID isolation we invite you to join the class or group that calls most to you.

- Small Group Ministry

- Community AA and NA Groups that meet in our church

Adult Spiritual Formation

These classes happen quarterly for one to six weeks and require registration. They are taught by church members or pastors and are designed to share insights and exploration in the spiritual journey. Some new topics you will see this quarter:

Discover "Hygge" (hyoo-guh) the Scandinavian practice of creating coziness, pleasure, contentment, comfort, hominess, cheer, and enjoyment in the dark months of winter. Lots of candles are involved. This is a one session class taught by Norwegian expert Ed Egerdahl.

Pastor Donna is teaching a four-week class on Visual Journaling. This class will help you bring a new dimension to your journaling through the use of images, color, and words. Faith teaches us that we have profound healing powers within us. The question is how to find them and put them to work for us.

A six-week class on The Mystery of Awe and Wonder will focus on the spiritual and healing aspects of sound, art, nature, and love, that inspire us with Awe and open us to the Divine in intenional ways.

We have three Bible study classes this quarter.



Women's Bible Study and Sacred Encounters by Rev. Dick Gibson. And a new study called Reading the Bible Through New Eyes by Alex Araujo, a former Evangelical who is finding new insights into the Bible as he has embraced a broader perspective on Jesus and his teachings.

Small Group Ministry

We currently have 13 regular groups that meet weekly or monthly year-round. There is something for everyone. Book groups, social groups, groups that meet to do service, to knit, watch movies and so much more. You can join these groups at any time just by emailing or contacting the group facilitator. Information on these groups and leaders is in the Program Guide.

Advocates for Justice Teams

These five groups meet through out the year on a weekly, as needed or monthly basis. These groups combine study and action and advocacy for particular local, national, and worldwide issues of justice. Contact the group faciliator listed in the Guide to join at any time.

Stephen Ministry

Stephen Ministry is a program of care and support offered by lay congregation members trained to provide one-to-one care to those experiencing a difficult time in life, such as grief, divorce, job loss, chronic or terminal illness, or relocation.

Bishop Cedrick D. Bridgeforth has called United Methodists across the Greater Northwest Area to follow Jesus' challenge in the story of the Good Samaritan to "go and do likewise." As people of faith, committed to the love of Christ in our various communities, we are encouraged to go the M.I.L.E

Beginning in early January, the Greater Northwest Area convened an intentional process with both laity and clergy to align the church's aspirations for diversity and inclusion with our practices and policies. This work is in alignment with Bishop Cedrick Bridgeforth's M.I.L.E. challenge for the church (Ministry that matters, Itineration and location, Lay ministry development and Eliminating racism). While this program is mainly focused on the process of eliminating racism, the work also has wide-reaching benefits for the other aspects of Bishop Cedrick's challenge.

Beth Lanie and I are the two participants from EUMC in the Facilitating Cultural Change program that runs from January through August this year. The program has three objectives: to embed an equity lens into our institutional (church) life, to form a culture that is self-reflective and flexible and to multiply this work. Each month, Beth and I will attend a full-day, in-person workshop, with smaller Action groups forming later in the process.

Before the first workshop, we were required to complete a lengthy personal Intercultural Development Inventory (IDI) assessment. The intention of the resulting report is to help us gain valuable insights about how we engage cultural differences by reflecting on both past and current cross-cultural events or situations

we have been or are involved in. Our individual IDI Profile helps us increase our own cultural self- and other-understanding around differences and commonalities. It helps us understand where we are currently on the continuum of intercultural development stages ranging from of denial (avoidance), polarization (us vs. them), minimization (overemphasis on commonality), acceptance (understands and values different) and adaptation (thinking and behavior that adapts to achieve equity goals).

My personal IDI profile showed quite a large gap between where I perceive myself to be along this continuum, versus where I actually am. It was reassuring to learn that this gap is present for the majority of people who take this assessment. From here, we are invited to complete an individual Intercultural Development Plan to address this gap. This plan will help us identify and engage in targeted, developmental efforts that increase our own intercultural competence in bridging across diverse communities.

As Beth and I continue deeper into the program, we are excited to share our learning about the self-reflection and actions that EUMC can take to become a more just and equitable church. Feel free to ask us questions and stay tuned for more sharing!
