### Letter from the Pastor

In the 12th chapter of the book of Romans, the apostle Paul lifts up the image of the church as the body of Christ. Eugene Peterson paraphrases Romans 12:4-6 with these words:

"In this way we are like the various parts of a human body. Each part gets its meaning from the body as a whole, not the other way around. ## Preparing for the Retreat on November 11



Last spring, we started meeting as a congregation to learn the dreams we each hold for Edmonds UMC. Ultimately, our prioritized dreams will help determine five congregation priorities to guide our collective decisions in the coming five years.

We are grateful so many of you participated in the first set of discussions about your dreams for our church.

Now, we are preparing the main event of our process, Strategic Planning Retreat on November 11th from 10:00 am to 3:00 pm in Kennedy Hall. So mark your calendars to attend and fill out the registration form at the bottom.

#### Strategic Planing Retreat 11-11

Why is it so important for you to come to this event? The Retreat where everything comes together to determine our five congregational Priority Goals for the next five years. We need your continued voice and input in the process – especially if you have not had a chance to come to the other meetings. All voices matter. This plan involves all of us.

We will review the survey information and workshop data where we learned about our collective dreams for the church and the knowledge gained from local demographic data, and review the community needs we learned about through one-to-one conversations. With this important step forward, our retreat will be led by Dana Brown, Leadership and Organizational Consultant with 20 years' experience directing non-profits and building the leadership of low-income people to make social change. The first part of the day will be an overview of the process, discussion about ground rules, and a review of our work done to this point as foundation for the day's work.

We will move between large and small group discussions throughout the day to share our thoughts and priorities for the church and then together distill those down into a handful of Priority Goal areas.

When we reach consensus on the five Priority Goals that we will use over the next five years to guide our missional work, we will begin the next step of identifying development ideas for each Priority Goal area and start conversations on those ideas. This step will continue beyond the retreat in small work groups to bring more clarity to specific measurable goals.

So it's important to adjust the conversation to what's on their minds. I just listen a lot."

Her hope and commitment to the church is that every child who enters the church doors feels safe, seen and celebrated. We all need safe places to be ourselves and express who we really are. Kids won't thrive without that. Every adult in this church has the opportunity to help make this a safe and open church for all our children. "Children need many adults they can trust and learn from, and churches are in a unique position to do that. In this digital age, we want them to have lots of faceto-face time with adults and peers. Intergenerational relationships are really important too. And they need lots of laughter, mental health tools, friendships, support and to celebrate beauty in all its forms." They need a community that will model and teach the formation of faith and grace.

## UMC Trial Reveals Underlying Systemic Racism

"We cannot learn from what we do not see, and so talking about (racism and anti-racism) in public is an important first step." Elicia Cardenas

September 15 to October 15 is Hispanic Heritage Month. The Racial Justice Team intended to share ways to observe and celebrate the contributions and work of our Hispanic siblings. Instead, we want to bear witness to our denomination's version of the trial of the century and offer some reflections on work that we must continue to do to end systemic racism. Bishop Minerva Carcaño, the first Latina bishop, also became the first to go on trial in the Western Jurisdiction in over 100 years. On Friday, September 22, her trial concluded when a jury dismissed all four charges against her. We want to share with our EUMC community how this trial demonstrates the need to do as Bishop Cedrick asks and confront systemic and structural racism.

Kimberlé Crenshaw, law professor and author of Critical Race Theory, explains that women of color experience an intersection of multiple systemic barriers. These barriers impact how women of color navigate the world. The socially constructed identities around race, gender, class, etc., have real consequences in health outcomes, career trajectories, and the ability to accumulate wealth. In a 2014 study, the General Commission on the Status and Role of Women (GCSRW) discovered that women of color comprise less than 4% of all clergy in our denomination. In the Pacific Northwest Conference, no women of color lead the most prominent and best-paying churches. As such, female clergy of color in our conference hit more than a glass ceiling. Carcaño's experience of a 19-month suspension and full jurisdictional trial is a prime example of structural and systemic racism. We see it. We name it. We ask our community to join us in a call to address it.

The Racial Justice Team recognizes that this trial impacts our clergy and laity of color, and we grieve and stand in solidarity with you.

The Racial Justice Team renews its commitment to the work of racial justice here at EUMC. We call for deep, con-



sistent conversations and antiracist actions to heal the wounds this trial caused. We remind our community of the upcoming discussions around how to become an antiracist and multicultural organization and the importance of learning our history. En Solidaridad.

### Mission Endowment Fund: Seed Money for Dreams

There are two mission endowment funds available for applications:

### The Dave and Kris Gillespie Endowment Fund

#### The Kathlyn James Endowment Fund

#### **Gillespie Fund**

The Gillespie fund provides grants to ministries already established within the church. Gillespie grants are awarded to outreach ministries that emphasize their commitment to "make disciples of Jesus Christ" in our community. These grants are intended to fund something extra for the ministry, and not just replace the regular budget.

For example, the Gillespie Fund has provided grants for scholarships to the Women's retreat and scholarships for children to be able to attend VBS.

Funds from the Gillespie grant were also used to expand EUMC's scouting program to develop a troop for girls.



The Gillespie Fund covered the cost of teaching materials, troop expenses for outings and scholarship funds for girls whose families were not able to pay the required dues needed to be a member.

#### Kathlyn James Endowment Fund

The Kathlyn James Endowment Fund provides grants for innovative ministry proposals submitted by members of EUMC. Applications must have a specific focus on serving families and children in poverty. Priority is given to applications that provide opportunities for active ministry participation by the EUMC faith community.

In the local community, Kathlyn James funds have assisted refugee families and children to resettle into our community.

### Caring for the Caregiver

"Thirty-nine percent of all adult Americans are caring for an adult with a chronic health condition. Caregiving can be a stressful responsibility leading to poor health, mental distress, and less life satisfaction for the caregiver. It can be challenging for caregivers to find the support that they need" (Danielle Day, Iowa State University)

Our Stephen Ministers are offering a series of three classes on Caregiving and how to care for loved ones while also caring for oneself. How do we care for our own needs while addressing the needs of the person we're caring for can seem an impossible challenge.

In the caregiving classes we will focus on precisely how to meet this challenge:

- How to identify and manage problem situations
- How to cope with the impact of stress while caregiving
- How to communicate effectively and establish healthy boundaries
- How to identify and manage emotions as a caregiver
